Objectives

- 1. Gain understanding of collaborative community approaches to domestic violence using Domestic Violence Action Committee (DVAC) and Cambridge Gender Based Violence Prevention Initiative as examples.
- 2. Increase awareness of the need to address domestic violence in every community.

- 4. Increase the knowledge on how to build a collaborative in a community.

Domestic Violence

Pattern of coercive and controlling behaviors and tactics used by one person over another to gain **power and control**.

This may include **verbal** abuse, **financial** abuse, **emotional**, **sexual**, and **physical** abuse.

Intimate Partner Violence occurs in heterosexual, as well as same-sex partnerships, and crosses all ethnic, racial and socio-economic lines.

Definition by the Massachusetts Executive Office of Public Safety and Security

Prevalence

- 1 in 5 women and 1 in 7 men have experienced severe physical violence from an intimate partner
- 1 in 5 women and 1 in 38 men have been raped in their lifetime
- 25-33% of LGBQ/T people experience abuse by a partner
- 2 out of 3 children are exposed to trauma and violence
- 1 in 5 tweens knows a victim of dating violence
- 1 in 11 female and 1 in 14 male high school students have experienced physical dating violence
- It is estimated that 1 out of 4 LGBQ/T youth will experience abuse from a dating partner
- 1 in 6 women and 1 in 17 men have been stalked at some point in their lives

Prevalence

2020 DV Census in MA

- 1,892 adults and children helped on one day, through emergency shelters, transitional housing, or non-residential assistance
- 434 survivors' requests for services were unmet because programs did not have the needed resources
 - Approximately 54% of these unmet requests were for housing or emergency shelter

DVAC Needham

- Established in 1996 to raise awareness of domestic violence, help prevent its prevalence, and support those impacted by domestic violence in Needham.
- The Bigwood Trust co-chaired by Health and Police.
- Currently ~8 Town agencies involved in addition to individual community members.
- Collaborate closely with REACH Beyond Domestic violence.

Cambridge Domestic & Gender-Based Violence Prevention Initiative (DGBVPI)

The Domestic and Gender-Based Violence Prevention Initiative (DGBVPI) engages and mobilizes Cambridge's communities, agencies, and City departments to change attitudes, behaviors, policies, and practices to prevent and bring attention to domestic and gender-based violence.

In collaboration with community leaders, local agencies, and interested citizens, the DGBVPI develops and provides accessible, safe, and relevant strategies and resources to prevent and respond to domestic violence in Cambridge. Services include training, consultation, building collaborations across various sectors in Cambridge, and coordination of systems of change in order to ensure compassionate and supportive environments for survivors of domestic and gender-based violence across the city.

- Making it clear that DV is an issue everyone needs to be attentive to and responsible for
